PAIDEIA

Paideia – The European Institute for Jewish Studies in Sweden (Paideia) is an academic framework founded in 2000 through foundational grants from the Swedish Government and the Marianne and Marcus Wallenberg Foundation. The mandate of Paideia is to nurture the renewal of European Jewish culture, to support cross-cultural dialogue and to promote a positive paradigm of minority culture within European societies. Paideia does this through highly intensive educational leadership programs, focusing on in-depth knowledge of Jewish sources and on social entrepreneurship.

Paideia is a non-confessional institution of excellence, innovation, know-how and literacy that produces individual leaders and a collective movement of activism. The matrix at Paideia merges academic life with professional and community work, and Jewish culture with the wider European society. Paideia is also the central hub for nurturing social innovation in Jewish Europe and has fostered more new initiatives than any other institution.

During its relatively short period of existence, Paideia has developed into a premier European learning center for Jewish studies and has been able to produce a strong group of leaders for a new paradigm of European Jewish community, culture, and knowledge. Paideia has since its inception been instrumental in putting Stockholm and Sweden on the map as a hub in European academic Jewish life.

Cornerstones in all of Paideia's undertakings are that European minority culture should build upon inclusiveness, critical thinking, openness and the support of a democratic civil society. It is a unique European institution, which under one roof combines academic teaching with programmatic support to grass roots initiatives and civil society, and the only such institution with a pan-European mission.

23 years after its inception, Paideia has over 800 program graduates from various programs. The graduates are national and local leaders in education, religion, museums, academia, and community life. Individually and collectively, they are creating a new paradigm of knowledge and activism within Jewish life in Europe, the life that they themselves would like to see.



PAIDEIA PROJECT-INCUBATOR

PAIDEIA PROJECT-INCUBATOR is a 10-day summer program for supporting the development of new initiatives for Jewish life and culture in Europe. It consists of advanced skills sessions, individual tutoring, workshops and learning provided by our extraordinary international staff of mentors and guests. The program was established in 2006 and was originally devised for graduates from the Paideia One-Year Program of Jewish Studies. Having spent two semesters of intensive studies of Jewish text in Stockholm, studying the great books of Jewish civilization, and becoming literate in Jewish thought, culture and language, they were looking for ways to create programming from which they may teach others in their institutions, communities and societies. There was also an urgent need from communities all over Europe for helping them to create programming. Paideia attempted to fill these needs and created a program supporting the development of new initiatives for European Jewish life.

It was the first program of tis kind in Jewish Europe and is still by far the continent's leading program for supporting social innovation in the Jewish sphere. To date, the program has promoted over 300 projects throughout Europe reaching hundreds of thousands of people all over the continent.

The Paideia Project-Incubator is a joint program organized in cooperation between Paideia – The European Institute for Jewish Studies in Sweden and Paideia Folkhögskola.

OTHER PROGRAMS

THE ONE-YEAR JEWISH STUDIES PROGRAM is Paideia's core activity and one of the most intensive and immersive Jewish learning experiences in Europe. The program focuses on the critical study of Jewish textual sources, from Bible to modern Jewish philosophy, furnishing the students with a firm grounding in the texts that have underpinned the development of Jewish civilization through the ages. It aims at providing literacy in Jewish texts, skills in textual interpretation and reinterpretation, and understanding of how Jewish texts have formed Jewish culture and civilization.

The Program combines traditional Hevruta study methodology, an academic approach to interpretation, and practical application. It is given at an academic level, with instructions delivered in part by resident faculty, in part by international teaching faculty from top international universities.

Since its inception in 2001, the program has graduated over 500 students (from over 40 countries), many of whom have gone on to further their studies and obtained a Ph.D. at different universities, while others have used their skills and knowledge in societal and cultural endeavors in Europe and its Jewish communities and institutions.

THE PARADIGM PROGRAM is Paideia's program for discussing big ideas and how creating a new paradigm of how to approach Judaism and Jewish identity. During a week in spring, the institute invites 3-4 major contemporary thinkers to discuss three major questions together with 20 young professionals from the US, Europe and Israel. As an offshoot of the program, in 2016 Paideia created facilitation training of the concept – Paradigm Ideas. The training resulted, so far, in close to 60 various sessions in Europe, reaching over 1000 people.

PAIDEIA ALUMNI ACTIVITIES, including the yearly alumni conference, gathering over 100 of Paideia's graduates from different programs, a micro grant scheme, Paideia Mifgash – a series of one-day learning sessions dedicated to strengthening the presence of Jewish thought and culture at the local and pan-European levels.



PROJECT: VIRTUAL WALK IN THE SYNAGOGUES

'Built heritage' is an integral part of European Jewish culture. The synagogues, cemeteries and other institutional buildings are the imprints of selfsustaining communities that were drastically affected by the Shoah. Our aim is to digitize and make accessible the architectural gems of Jewish communities, by offering interactive educational programs about Jewish life and heritage as reflected in the buildings. Currently, eight synagogues in Hungary and Slovakia can be visited virtually but many more await discovery.

Our platform is an opportunity for the Jewish diaspora to reconnect with its roots. The website has the potential to reintegrate Jewish life and traditions back into the local heritage landscape, bringing new relevance of the past life to the present of Jews and non-Jews alike.

Visitors to the site have the opportunity to participate in reenacting Jewish life in Europe by contributing to the maintenance and preservation of the sites.

The digitization of Jewish built heritage is managed by the Cödokó Foundation in partnership with the Federation of Hungarian Jewish Communities (Mazsihisz).



Chairperson, the Kidma Association, HUNGARY

Ákos is from Budapest but has also lived in Israel for a number of years. His educational background is in journalism and communication management. He has been active in the Hashomer Hacair youth organization in Budapest, which he now represents as Chairperson. After completing his studies, he worked at the JCC as a coordinator and as a professional photographer. Since 2014, he has worked as Chief of Staff at the Federation of Hungarian Jewish Communities (MAZSIHISZ), focusing actively on the development of the Jewish community in Hungary. Ákos was a student of the 2022-2023 One-Year Jewish Studies Program at Paideia.



ALIK KORPHO Cultural Entrepreneur, Artist, Performer, ISRAEL

Alik was born in Tbilisi, Georgia and currently lives in Ein Hod, an artists' village on a hill at the foot of Mount Carmel. He has as 20 years of experience in creating cultural initiatives. His recent project connects the youth to the community in the major cities of Israel through learning and experiencing music.

PROJECT: COMMUNITY DJ BAND

In many European Jewish communities, much like elsewhere, there is a decrease in the interest and involvement of young people in the Jewish communities. We believe that facilitating opportunities for young people to be active contributors locally can create new meaningful connections in the community. Based on our previous experience in Israel over the past ten years, we believe music could be the perfect tool. We train young people to become DJs.

During the one year-long program we work together as a group with of up to ten members from the local Jewish community in weekly workshops. The training includes all the professional aspects of the DJ artform. The teenagers will gain new future employment opportunities and a platform to work together in and for the community.

The project is carried out by Alik Korpho who is anawarded cultural entrepreneur, artist, performer and the CEO of Smart Music College, with 20 years of experience in original cultural initiatives.



PROJECT: SUMMER UNIVERSITY IN JEWISH STUDIES

At many German universities, Jewish Studies are taught as part of other disciplines in humanities or within departments for Christian theology, which results in young scholars lacking an intellectual community for exchanging ideas and growing professionally. The Summer University in Jewish Studies is an online educational program that brings together students and young scholars interested in Jewish life and culture in the South of Germany. It will be organized as a cooperative program between several Jewish Studies departments in the region, allowing the participants to build an academic network in the early stages of their careers, as well as to acquire credits towards their study programs. The participants will have the opportunity to choose from several seminars, which will run in parallel over the course of two weeks, with the option of attending in-person sessions at participating institutions.


In the summer of 2024, The Summer University in Jewish Studies will be dedicated to exploring the material culture in the "ShUM" sites of Speyer, Worms, and Mainz through a variety of disciplinary perspectives, including that of history, visual studies, and Jewish law.



DANA DAYMAND

Research assistant in Jewish Philosophy and Intellectual History, Hochschule für Jüdische Studien Heidelberg, GERMANY

Dana was born in Beer-Sheva, Israel, and raised in Saint Petersburg, Russia. She pursued her B.A. in Liberal Arts at Bard College Berlin and was also trained in the disciplines of Philosophy and Jewish Studies at Freie Universität Berlin, Tel Aviv University, and the Hochschule für Jüdische Studien Heidelberg. After completing the One-Year Jewish Studies Program at Paideia, she moved to Heidelberg, where she joined the MA program in Jewish Civilizations and worked at the Central Archives for Research on the History of the Jews in Germany. She is currently an employed research assistant at the Chair for Jewish Philosophy and Intellectual History at the Hochschule für Jüdische Studien Heidelberg.



EYAL DAVIDOVITCH Multidisciplinary artist and filmmaker, GERMANY

Eyal Davidovitch is a film director, editor and scriptwriter. He is the firstprize winner of the Haaretz short story competition, and has worked on various prize-winning short films. His debut documentary feature film (co-direction) "The Young Kadyas" toured festivals worldwide and was shown in cinemas throughout Germany. For over 6 years, Eyal has worked with the Other Music Academy empowerment center, documenting their social vision, teaching, participating as an artist, and creating workshops and various film projects in international contexts. He studied at the Sam Spiegel Film School in Jerusalem and in the Marc Rich Multidisciplinary Honors Program for Humanities and Arts at Tel Aviv University. Currently, Eyal is creating and dreaming in both Tel Aviv and Berlin.

PROJECT: ALAN BERN AND THE OTHER MUSIC

Once a year a community of individuals from more than 25 countries and from ages between 5-95, gather together for six weeks to learn, research, explore, reimagine and perform Yiddish culture. Out of all places it happens in a small, yet symbolic place - the city of Weimar, Germany. And yet, Yiddish culture is often believed to be completely erased, and this incredible phenomenon remains under the radar.

A feature-length documentary film will share the story of the American Jewish musician and thinker Alan Bern, who has been a significant force in the revival of Yiddish culture for over 35 years, as the founder and leader of 'Yiddish Summer Weimar'. The film will capture Alan's journey, and thereby unveils a completely different narrative from the known post-Shoah Jewish existence.

Eyal Davidovitch is an experienced film director and editor. He has been documenting Alan and the festival over the last six years. The film is in the midst of the filming stage, and is currently attracting funds as it enters soon into the editing and post-production phases.



PROJECT: THEY ARE HERE

Few Swedes, including locals, are aware that Karlstad, town in Värmalnd, has an interesting Jewish history. They are here is a project dedicated to the memory of Jewish women who came to Karlstad from Bergen Belsen in the 'White Boats Action' and died shortly afterwards. Their temporary presence is evidenced by the tombstones in the Jewish cemetery whose history dates back to the XIX century. What we know about the women are their names, dates of birth and dates of death engraved in stone.

The aim of the project is to restore and deepen the knowledge about the stories of these Jewish women, while exploring and reflecting on their place in the local history. Honoring their lives also gives us an opportunity to examine whether the Holocaust is the part of this history, what memory is and why we need it today.

Each part of the multidisciplinary project and working methods is designed to reach different generations of the Karlstad community. The research is to be the starting point for future workshops, including artistic ones, which leitmotif is to be water, an important element of the local landscape.

Karolina Dzięciołowska, with extensive experience in historical heritage and storytelling, will be implementing the project in partnership with ABF Värmland.



KAROLINA DZIĘCIOŁOWSKA Freelance writer, editor and guide, SWEDEN

Karolina is from Warsaw, Poland. She has studied journalism at Warsaw University and worked for the POLIN Museum of the History of Polish Jews in Warsaw for several years. She lives in Sweden since 2020 and works as a freelance author, editor, researcher and guide.



KSENIIA NIKISHYNA Project coordinator, UKRAINE

Ksenia lives in Zaporizhzhia, Ukraine. She has graduated from the Zaporizhzhia National University with a degree in philology. Ksenia works in the JCC "Mazal Tov" as a coordinator for the Junior club, the Teenage club and the Freedom project. Ksenia is actively involved in the life of the Jewish community. She is interested in working with children, in Jewish tradition and culture, and in project development.



PROJECT: ART WITHOUT BORDERS

For the past four years, children with disabilities in the Ukrainian city of Zaporizhzhia, fifteen kilometers from the war front line, have been completely isolated and stuck at home. First due to the Covid pandemic (due to their illness and/or disability, they are at higher risk to develop health issues) and now as a result of the war with Russia. Without shelters, institutions such as schools and kindergarten have been closed. These children have little opportunity to communicate with peers and to study, often resulting in a regression both in their physical and mental situation.

The JCC "Mazal Tov" is now offering these children home activities led by a group of teenagers, including one with disabilities. Together they study Judaism in interesting ways, leading to the creation of videos and musical clips. The videos and clips produced are used not only as tools to disseminate information about Judaism and traditions, but also to highlight the added values of integration of children with disability in the general community for the benefit of all.

As a madricha in summer camps, Kseniia Nikishyna has initiated groups over the years in which children with and without disabilities have participated together, enabling them to experience the richness of integration. This current project is initiated by Kseniia in order to bring these activities into the everyday lives of children, including during these emergency periods we are living in.

PROJECT: JEWISH IMPRESSIONS

In many remote Polish towns Jewish life and heritage is forgotten. The residents lack encounters with the rich culture that was once there. The synagogues stand empty and unused.


ROKduo is a professional violin duo, performing Jewish music in deserted synagogues across rural Poland, offering a musical excursion into the diverse, enchanting world of Jewish culture. Jewish Impressions is a concert program that includes Ashkenazi and Sephardic traditional melodies, as well as musical pieces by Polish, German, French, and American composers inspired by Jewish themes. During the concert, the origin and history of each music piece are presented. The concert is followed by informal Q&A session. This program will be performed ten times during 2023-2024.

These performances will broaden the local population's knowledge of Jewish culture, while at the same time providing local authorities with the incentive to repurpose the synagogues as a contemporary place of culture. They will also benefit the small Jewish community along with other minority groups, hopefully contributing to a more open and tolerant society aware of its multicultural and diverse origins and heritage.



MARCIN DAVID KRÓL Violinist and prayer leader in the Reform Synagogues, POLAND

Marcin was born in Kraków, Poland. He studied the violin at the University of Music in Kraków and in Cologne, Germany. Marcin works as a violinist in the Radom Chamber Orchestra and is also a member of the violin duo "ROKduo". In addition, he works as a prayer leader, violinist and cantor in the Reform Congregations of Kraków and Lublin. Marcin is involved in the promotion of Jewish culture in Poland through artistic and educational activities. He is interested in intercultural and interreligious dialogue through art, spirituality and travelling.



MARYIA SHLIAKHTSINA

Press secretary and program coordinator, Union of Belarussian Jewish Public Associations and Communities (UBJOC), BELARUS

Maryia was born in Zhlobin, Belarus. She graduated from the Faculty of Philology at the Belarusian State University with a degree in Belarusian Language and Literature, and a specialist degree in Business Communication. Since 2017, she has been an active member of the Jewish community in Minsk, where she lives. She works as a press secretary and program coordinator at the UBJOC. Maryia also works for Hillel Minsk, as a Madrich of the Taglit program and as a teacher of tradition in the Jewish Sunday school at the synagogue.

PROJECT: THE 'COMMUNAL LEADERSHIP' PROJECT

The first Jewish community in Belarus appeared in the 13th century. Since then, the community had its ups and downs. In the last years, as the community is aging, young people feel disconnected from their community and therefore their identity.

UBJOC (Union of Belarussian Jewish Associates and Communities) is an umbrella organization of 33 nonreligious Jewish organizations in 16 towns all over Belarus, with the goal to change that reality with the help of strong and creative communal leaders.

A group of young Jewish activists is identifying current and future community leaders all over the country, offers them skills and counseling to build and implement a plan of actions for the renewal of their communities.

As of today, two years after the creation of this initiative, a new spirit is felt in the Jewish Belarus community: more than 9000 Jews are now regularly taking part in different holidays celebrations and Jewish life events, sending their children to four new Sunday schools and participating in courses and workshops on Jewish history, culture and tradition. These efforts are helping individuals at various stages of life to find their place in the community and strengthen their connection with their Jewishness.

PROJECT: YALLAGAN -JEWISH EVENTS PLATFORM

Currently access to information regarding Jewish events across Europe is complicated. As a result, individuals often remain disconnected from the option of engaging in events that could enhance their Jewish involvement and sense of belonging. Yallagan is a centralized Jewish ecosystem that offers a one-stop shop for Jewish events, helping people find and join their local and international events while helping community builders reach more people and make an impact.

The platform, by registration for security reasons, has the potential to create a safe platform for Jewish communities, businesses and Jews all over the world. It is easy to navigate and to share the information needed in order to participate in Jewish life.

Yallagan was founded by three young people, joined together to help other Jews find their connection in their local communities and internationally. Continuity and connection is an essential part of the project's mission and vision.





MICHAEL STERN

Co-Founder and executive chairman of Yallagan, GERMANY

Michael was born and lives in Düsseldorf. He studied health care management and is currently attaining further education in the field of medical assistance for consulting about sleep and nutrition. In 2022, he co-founded Yallagan (www.yallagan.com), a Jewish events platform to bring all Jewish events into one place. With this project, he wants to connect Jewish people worldwide and to enable their participation in various global events.



MIHAELA CHELARU

Researcher, ITALY

Mihaela was born in a small city called Botosani in Romania. She holds a Bachelor's degree in Economics and International Marketing, a Master's in International Business and Law, and an Executive Master's in Digital Business. Currently, she is a Ph.D. researcher in Innovation, Labor and Development.

PROJECT: REDISCOVERING JEWISH LEGACY

Since 1555, the Jewish quarter in the Northern Italian city of Reggio Emilia and other cities in the region has been at the center of Jewish life. However, the rich Jewish heritage in the region has gradually faded from public consciousness, resulting in a lack of visibility and understanding of its history and cultural contributions on the part of its residents.

The project aims to bring Jewish heritage to the forefront, fostering inclusivity, combating prejudice, and enriching cultural understanding in Reggio Emilia and other surrounding cities with Jewish historical footprints in North Italy. It is organized by a group of passionate volunteers possessing the expertise and cultural sensitivity required to effectively collaborate with the Municipality and engage the local community.

The approach involves advocating for increased accessibility to the synagogue, organizing guided tours, and cultural events. It will also highlight the contributions of prominent Jewish personalities, deepening the understanding and appreciation of this rich cultural heritage.

PROJECT: T'CHIYA CONFERENCE ON JUDAISM AND ECOLOGY

At this critical moment for our climate and biosphere, the Jewish tradition offers powerful guidance, teaching us that it's not only possible to choose a more sustainable and just future, it's our responsibility to do so. Many Jews in Europe are concerned about climate and ecological justice, but there's not yet a European framework for Jewish leadership and collaboration on these issues. Because of this, we're missing opportunities to activate individuals and communities around Jewish values of stewardship and sustainability, to change behaviors within our communities, and to advocate for systemic changes in our societies.

In 2023, a working group of Jewish activists from Barcelona founded T'Chiya to address these issues. It will start by gathering and training key Jewish leaders and educators from across Europe, giving them uniquely Jewish tools to elevate climate and ecological justice as important issues within their communities. Through activities these leaders organize locally, and then through a conference for a broad group of interested Jews, T'Chiya will build the conversation on Judaism and Ecology into a connected, influential movement.



NOAH FULTON-BEALE Writer and musician, SPAIN

Noah Fulton Beale, from Colorado, USA, is a writer, musician, and activist. After training professionally as a musician, he spent seven years touring the US as a sideman before starting an original performance project. He currently lives in Barcelona, where he's lead user experience writer at a language learning company, founder of the Barcelona chapter of Work On Climate, and an innovator searching for new ways to activate traditional spiritual technologies for climate and ecological regeneration.



NOELIA BERNARDEZ

Student, community manager and cultural events coordinator, Mozaika, SPAIN

Noelia is a historian with a background in Jewish Studies and a passion for promoting Jewish history and culture. She is currently pursuing a master's degree in Jewish Civilizations at Heidelberg University and is actively involved in the Jewish community in Barcelona, organizing cultural events and educational activities, and promoting awareness of Jewish heritage. Her travels have also given her a deeper appreciation for Jewish communities around Europe and Latin America.

PROJECT: BEIT MIDRASH OF BARCELONA

Existing educational initiatives in Spain tend to focus on religious and philological approaches, often overlooking other aspects of the rich cultural heritage of Judaism. The Beit Midrash of Barcelona (BM) offers a diverse and comprehensive program, transforming the traditional and secluded Beit Midrash into an inclusive space, and welcoming individuals from all backgrounds to engage in the study of Jewish heritage.

Located in Barcelona's historic Jewish quarter, BM has been developing diverse educational projects since its establishment in 2021. These initiatives delve into disciplines such as Jewish philosophy, literature, music, art, history, and spirituality. We are collaborating with scholars from different universities and partner with renowned institutions to enrich our programs.


By preserving the methodologies of Jewish text study, BM creates an environment that enables intellectual growth and cross-cultural dialogue for both Jews and non-Jews. Through our efforts, we revitalize the Jewish community and empower individuals to connect with their roots. By combating ignorance and fostering understanding, we are also serving to counteract rising antisemitism and xenophobia.

PROJECT: JUDAISM FUN AGAIN

Through short and entertaining animated videos, Judaism Fun Again wants to explain in an easy and fun way what it means to be Jewish in today's world and to show it as a living and relevant tradition. Judaism Fun Again is addressing the lack of original contemporary Jewish content in the Czech language that would be comprehensible and accessible in the form of new media to both Jews and non-Jews of all ages. We want to fill the knowledge-gap and provide entertaining educational tools, thus motivating Jews to want to further explore their identity and to help non-Jews understand Jewish culture sans prejudices.


Our previous projects include comics, cookbook, podcast, holiday videos all using the same spirit of making Judaism fun. The positive reactions (3000 sold copies, 20k+ listeners, 4000+ views) demonstrate the real thirst the Czech people have for quality educational materials.

Is it kosher? What does Shabbat mean? Why and how to read and study Torah and much more. These are the topics we want to explore more in the upcoming project and prove that Judaism is still relevant today and can be fun again!



PAVLINA ŠULCOVÁ Project manager and creative producer, CZECH REPUBLIC

Pavlina comes from, and currently lives in, Prague. She is behind projects such as "Are We There Yet, Moses?", "Here We Are, Moses!!!", "Don't Be Afraid of Gefilte Fish", animated videos about Jewish holidays and the podcast "Pre-cooked Bible". She was in charge of the Prague JCC during the pandemic. Previously, she has been the Executive Director of the Prague Quadrennial (2018-2020) and the Deputy Director at the Czech Center Tel Aviv (2013-2018). She has also initiated and produced several independent Czech Israeli art projects. Pavlina graduated from the Faculty of Social Sciences and the Faculty of Humanities, Charles University in Prague. She participated at the Paideia Paradigm Program in 2022.



SLAÐANA-SARIT NINKOVIĆ-LEKANIĆ

Senior advisor, Jewish Community of Sarajevo, BOSNIA AND HERZEGOVINA

Slađana-Sarit is from Sarajevo, Bosnia, and Herzegovina. She is a Professor of Pedagogy. She also works part-time in the Jewish community as a coordinator of a Jewish school.



PROJECT: THE SUNDAY SCHOOL -LIVE AND LOVE THROUGH JEWISH TRADITION

With a rich history dating back to the war in 1992, Sarajevo's Sunday school stands as a beacon of safety and protection for children. Originally established for Jewish members, it has evolved into a welcoming space for all people from Sarajevo during the war. Each Sunday, this school continues to operate, with a mission to engage and uplift inactive community members. Our target group includes children and parents, fostering a sense of belonging not only within Sarajevo but also in other cities across Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Through a blend of art, music, dance, and interactive learning, we infuse our lessons with excitement and make education a joyous experience. We also explore an array of resources and activities related to Jewish customs and traditions, ensuring a multicultural approach with all members of our community.

Our team comprises two teachers and two assistants who are passionate about instilling Jewish values and promoting community involvement. Despite being a small community, we pride ourselves on creating a strong sense of belonging and inspiring active participation of our members.

PROJECT: JEWISH SACRED MUSIC AND KABBALAH

In the Netherlands, there is a noticeable absence of Jewish spiritual practices deeply rooted in tradition. Among individuals aged 20-50, there is a decline in active engagement with the Jewish community and a growing disconnect from Jewish traditions.

Drawing from my own authentic journey of reconnecting with Judaism, I have developed a unique spiritual approach that combines my diverse background as a psychologist, dedicated Kabbalah student, musician, and devoted Jew.

Through musical concerts and communal singing of newly composed melodies for ancient Jewish prayers, participants can forge a renewed connection to the ancient tradition. Workshops and events centered around Jewish festivals, infused with knowledge from the Kabbalah, serve as inspirational tools for personal and spiritual growth.



She is educated as a psychologist, coach and trainer and has been working in education, business and non-profit organizations to help people in their personal development and collaboration. Tali is also an active musician since many years.





TEONA DALAKISHVILI

Educator and founder of the Peace Synagogue, GEORGIA

Teona has been working in the field of Civil Society and Development project management since 2009, as an educator and implementer of different projects and programs in Georgia, South Caucasus, Europe and the Middle East. Apart from being an educator, both in the non-formal and formal (university) fields, she has substantial experience in leading projects focusing on economic empowerment, peace building and political education with special emphasis on areas affected by conflict (Balkans, Middle East, Caucasus, Ukraine). Teona is also the proud founder of the Peace Synagogue in Georgia. Since 2020, she has been working as a local coordinator for Centropa, mainly with Georgian teachers and schools, on integrating Jewish heritage in school curriculums.

PROJECT: THE PEACE SYNAGOGUE IN TBILISI

Twenty-six centuries of friendship between Georgian and Jewish people has had an invaluable influence on the development of Georgian culture and society, and vice versa. And yet, due to the decrease of Jewish population, there is often a lack of awareness at the current time about Jewish culture and our common history.

Our mission is to enhance Jewish ways of life by providing a space for education, exploration, study, prayer, ceremonies, and community gatherings of Jewish significance for both Jews and non-Jews, thereby increasing inter-faith fellowship and understanding. The Peace Synagogue invites teachers, educators, and students who are interested to learn more about Jewish life and culture into an open and welcoming Jewish community place. We embrace pluralism, facilitating a process of learning more about each other and celebrating our diversity.

The Peace Synagogue is an autonomous initiative founded within the context of the Peace Cathedral, an interfaith initiative undertaken by the Evangelical Baptist Church of Georgia in collaboration with Centropa to work with teachers and educators.

PROJECT: THE "WISE-AGE PROJECT"

The "Wise-Age Project" addresses the challenges that come with aging, including the issues of loneliness and disconnection from family and community. The project aims to support both individuals on their aging journey and their companions through a range of inter-generational programs, empowering workshops, heartwarming social gatherings, and engaging activities such as:

"Share Your Story", where the elderly can share their personal experiences and receive a platform to express themselves.

"Writing a Forever Letter", where individuals of all ages can create heartfelt messages that resonate and leave a lasting inter-generational impact.

"Le'dor Va'dor", where diverse generations come together to create a significant art installation, destined to be a cherished token for years to come.

"Companionship Circles", a supportive and interactive group where those accompanying an aging person can share experiences, seek guidance, and connect with others in similar situations.

The International Jewish Center in Brussels has long embraced the elderly, fostering a sense of belonging and inter-generational connection.



TSDAFF GOLAN

Math teacher and administrator at the International Jewish Center in Brussels, BELGIUM

Tsdaff is originally from Israel. He studied Chemistry and Mathematics at the Hebrew University, as well as Educational Leadership and Policy at the Open University. Currently, he lives in Brussels and works at Ono Academic College, the International Jewish Center in Brussels and as a freelancing math teacher. He has been involved in a local community help line in Belgium and is interested in tackling feelings of isolation and emotional struggles within the local community, giving particular attention to the needs of the elderly.



URIEL AISKOVICH

Researcher, educator and rabbinical student, GERMANY

Uriel is a Political Science graduate from the University of Buenos Aires, with a specialization in Cultural Diversity and Jewish Studies. He has also completed the second M2 Seniors Educators cohort from the Institute of Jewish Experiential Education in New York. Uriel is the founder of ID (Identity and Diversity Talks), Shagriria, MINU, and the Altneuland Foundation (an organization that uses art to break prejudices). He is also a lecturer of Philosophy of Social Science and Political Theory at the University of Buenos Aires. For the past 15 years, Uriel has served as the Community Director at Centro Hebreo Iona (Iona Hebrew Center). Recently, Uriel moved to Germany to continue his Rabbinical Studies at the Abraham Geiger College together with an MA in Jewish Theology at Potsdam University.

PROJECT: THE ID-IDENTITY AND DIVERSITY INITIATIVE

While everyone agrees that diversity is a core value of our communities, many Jews in Europe are facing the challenge of being actively involved in them. Their voices are not heard, leading to these people to disconnect from their roots and beliefs, as many communities stagnate or even move to a survival mode.

Through a four-month experiential training process, participants in the ID Initiative reconnect with their identities and Jewish heritage, identify their unique stories and learn how to share them in a human, honest, and concise manner.

The ID-Identity and Diversity initiative enables personal narratives that have a positive impact on the Jewish communities, welcoming new members and on those who share them through the process of self-exploration.

Having successfully organized ID Initiatives in Argentina and other cities across Latin America for eight years, our next goal is to launch ID- Europe. To achieve this, we propose a collaboration with leaders from key European Jewish communities denominations who can use the ID model so that they grow both in numbers and active engagement.


PROJECT: REVIVAL OF JEWISH YOUTH IN LATVIA

There are many Jewish communities in Latvia where the number of elderly people exceeds by far that of younger generation. Unfortunately, because of different interests and perspectives on many things, the younger generation often loses interest and many of them either leave the community or go there infrequently.

We, members of this younger generation, propose to revive the spirit of a young and vivid Jewish Youth in Latvia.



WANDA TEPLITSKY BALBOA Doctoral student, SPAIN





In 2007. she received the prestigious Max M. Fisher Prize for Jewish Education in the Diaspora and in 2016, the Abraham Geiger Medal. In 2018, she received The King's Medal for her outstanding contribution for Jewish culture in Sweden and beyond.





EIRAN DAVIES Educator at Paideia and Paideia Folkhögskola

Rabbi Firan Davies studied for the rabbinate at The Judith Lady Montefiore College at Ramsgate, the rabbinical programme of the Spanish and Portuguese Jews' congregation in London, England. Subsequently, he undertook further study at various institutions in Israel, including Yeshivat Hamivtar in Efrat, Midrash Sephardi in Jerusalem, and the Straus-Amiel rabbinical fellowship. Back in the UK, he worked on a number of innovative projects within the Jewish community, including Grassroots Jews, a non-denominational space for Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur, Bee the Change, an initiative to encourage urban Jews to become beekeepers, and was a founding partner in Ruchot, a kosher vegetarian community cafe. Eiran now lives in Stockholm with his wife Yael. and their two children.




